IN RE: MINUTES

Upon motion duly made and carried the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

IN RE: PAYMENT OF CLAIMS

Upon motion duly made and carried it is ordered by the Board that the accounts against the following funds for the month of January 1971 be issued payable out of the respective accounts. General Fund - Checks numbering 71-83 through 71-128 amounting to \$19,267.74. Dog Fund - Checks numbering D-71-1 through D-71-7 amounting to \$816.70.

IN RE: TREASURER'S REPORT

W. E. Bolte, Deputy Treasurer, presented his report for the month of January 1971. Upon examination, motion was made and carried approving said report and endorsing all transfers thereof.

Mr. Bolte requested that \$345.36 be transferred from the General Fund to the Jail Fund.

Upon motion of Mr. Hargrave, seconded by Mr. Winn, the Board unanimously approved this request.

IN RE: WELFARE DEPARTMENT

Mrs. King B. Talley had no requests to make of the Board. She did state that she was having problems hiring competent personnel and retaining a complete staff. She asked the Board if they had any suggestions as to persons available.

IN RE: SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Mr. T. W. Newsom informed the Board that he had purchased the International Van that was authorized at the last meeting.

IN RE: PURCHASE - GENERAL PURPOSE CARS

The purchase of general purpose cars was discussed at great length. Mr. Newsom requested one new car for the School Board. Mrs. Talley presented a letter from the Virginia Department of Welfare & Institutions approving the purchase of 2 cars for the Dinwiddie County Welfare Department. The State will pay 60% and the County 40% of the purchase price.

Upon motion of Mr. Hargrave, seconded by Mr. Winn, the Board unanimously approved the purchase of one new car for the School Board and 2 new cars for the Welfare Department. These cars to be purchased from the lowest bidder. Bids were opened at the January 20th meeting.

IN RE: DOG WARDEN

Mr. A. W. Chappell presented his report for the month of January. The following claims were filed by Mr. Chappell. Mr. C. E. Goolsby - 1 goat - \$4.00; Jessie Meredith - 2 pigs - \$8.00 each; Mrs. Jerry Gunn - 4 hens \$1.00 each.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, the Board unanimously approved the above claims.

IN RE: HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Mr. R. V. Lancaster, III and Mr. B. C. Medlock, representing the Highway Department appeared before the Board.

Mr. Lancaster informed the Board that the bridge on Route 612 (Harper's Bridge) should be opened sometime next week.

IN RE: VIRGINIA DIVISION OF FORESTRY

Mr. H. C. Wells, Forester, reported to the Board that he was very pleased with the small number of forest fires during 1970 and that no wild forest fires were able to cover as much as 10 acres.

This was due mainly to the help of the volunteer fire departments throughout the County and volunteer fire department in surrounding Counties.

He suggested that Dinwiddie County should write letters to the volunteer fire departments in surrounding counties thanking them for their assistance.

Upon motion of Mr. Tunstall, seconded by Mr. Hargrave, the Executive Secretary was instructed to write the above letters as suggested by Mr. Wells.

IN RE: AUXILIARY POLICE

Mr. Earl Gwaltney appeared before the Board to request that they authorize the purchase of County license plates for the auxiliary police providing they are not members of a volunteer fire department or the rescue squad.

Upon motion of Mr. Hargrave, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, the above request was granted.

IN RE: PLANNING COMMISSION MEMBER - P. A. GLASS, JR

Mr. Hargrave nominated Mr. P. A. Glass, Jr. to represent Rowanty District on the Planning Commission. This nomination was seconded by Mr. Winn and unanimously approved by the Board.

IN RE: DELINQUENT TAXES

Mr. H. B. Batte, Clerk, Circuit Court gave a report on delinquent tax collections in 1968 and 1969. He requested an attorney be retained to dispose of land that taxes have not been paid on.

IN RE: PURCHASE OF 5 CHAIR MATS APPROVED FOR CLERK'S OFFICE

Mr. H. B. Batte requested that he be authorized to purchase 5 chair mats to be placed in the Circuit Court Office.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, the Board unanimously approve the purchase of 5 chair mats.

IN RE: NARCOTIC SEMINAR

Mr. H. T. Williams, III explained to the Board that a narcotic seminar was being held in Chicago in February and in Las Vegas in April. He stated he could not attend the one in Chicago, but was considering attending the one in Las Vegas. He said he would return to the Board at a later meeting for monetary assistance.

Mr. Watkins asked Mr. Williams to check to see if there was a state narcotics school available.

IN RE: EQUIPMENT FOR JAIL

The Board was presented a letter from the sheriff's department requesting a washer, dryer, floor polisher and buffer for the jail.

After some discussion the Chairman instructed the Executive Secretary to get more detailed information and report back at the February 17th meeting.


IN RE: JANITORAL SERVICE - APPROVED

The Executive Secretary explained to the Board that he had received bids on commercial janitorial service with the idea of retaining such service and eliminating all extra help. In addition the Health Department had agreed to increase their rent \$115.00 per month if that service was provided by the County.

The Executive Secretary further explained that the present cleaning set-up was very unsatisfactory. Dr. McNiell of the Health Department and Mr. J. E. Goodwyn ASCS told the Board that some change was needed in the janitorial service as their employees were very unhappy with the present set-up. The Board was in agreement that the county buildings were not being cleaned as they should and were in a deplorable condition.

Upon motion of Mr. Hargrave, seconded by Mr. Winn the Board unanimously authorized (the chair voting "aye") the executive secretary to retain a janitorial firm. The monthly cost not to exceed \$841.00 per month. If the executive secretary thought it necessary he may have this janitorial firm provide an initial clean up of all the buildings, the cost not exceeding \$176.00.

There being no further business to be brought before the Board the meeting adjourned at 5:05 P.M.
