IN RE: PAYMENT OF CLAIMS

Upon motion of Mr. Tunstall, seconded by Mr. Crowder - Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Crowder, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Winn and Mr. Hargrave, all voting "aye", it is ordered by the Board that the accounts against the following funds for the month of May 1972, be issued payable out of the respective accounts. General Fund - Checks numbering 72-689 through 72-796 amounting to \$17,218.82. Dog Fund - Checks numbering D-72-34 through D-72-42 amounting to \$1,234.43.

IN RE: MINUTES

Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, all members voting "aye", the minutes of the April 17th meeting were approved without being read.

IN RE: BUILDING INSPECTOR

Mr. Blaha gave his report for the month of May. He also asked the Board if they wished to have another building inspector come to inspect the home he is planning to build for himself.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, all members voting "aye", Mr. Blaha was authorized to inspect his own home in the same manner as he inspects other homes.

F. E. Jones, Treasurer, presented his report for the month of May 1972.

IN RE: W. L. FIELDS - REAPPOINTED SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER

Upon motion of Mr. Tunstall, seconded by Mr. Winn, all members voting "aye", Mr. W. L. Fields was reappointed to the School Board for a term of 4 years - said term expiring June 30, 1976.

This was the first appointment made by the Board, since the March 7th referendum gave them this authority.

IN RE: S. L. H. APPLICATION

Mrs. Jacqueline Williams appeared before the Board and presented an application for State and Local Hospitalization. Mrs. Williams recommended approval of this request.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, all members voting "aye", Mr. Winn, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Crowder, Mr. Rundle and Mr. Hargrave, this state and local hospitalization request was approved for Mr. Paul Davis, Route 1, Ford, Virginia.

IN RE: DOG WARDEN

Mr. A. W. Chappell presented his report for the month of May 1972.

IN RE: DINWIDDIE COUNTY HUNTING & FISHING DAY - 4TH SATURDAY- SEPT

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, all members voting "aye", the following resolution was adopted:

Because of the outstanding contributions of American's hunters and fishermen to recreation, conservation and the economy, they are deserving of special recognition.

Since the turn of the century, hunters and anglers have been the leaders in major conservation programs in our cities, states and Washington. These sportsmen-conservationists are responsible for the founding of state fish and game departments in all 50 states. They asked that they, themselves, be required to buy hunting and fishing licenses and that the money collected be used to support state conservation agencies. Hunters and fishermen asked for season and bag limits so that everyone would have a fair chance to harvest the annual crop of game and fish without damage to the basic breeding stock of any species. Further, sportsmen's programs have benefited hundreds of non-game fish and wildlife through habitat development.

Hunters and fishermen, unique in all America, asked that their fishing and hunting equipment be taxed and that the money be used for land acquisition, research and habitat management for fish and wildlife for the enjoyment of all Americans. Through their publications and organizations -- such as the National Wildlife Federation, Ducks Unlimited, Izaak Walton League of America and many others-- hunters and fishermen have led the nation in the battle for a better environment and the wise use of our natural resources.

THEREFORE, The Board of Supervisors of Dinwiddie County, does hereby proclaim September 23, 1972, as Dinwiddie County Hunting and Fishing Day and that this Day be an annual observance the fourth Saturday of each September. We urge all of our citizens to join with sportsmen-conservationists in a rededication to the wise use of our natural resources and their proper management for the benefit of future generations. Further, we urge all citizens to visit sportsmen's clubs on Dinwiddie County Hunting and Fishing Day to learn more about conservation and outdoor skills.

IN RE: BUDGET 1972-73 APPROVED

IN RE: TAX LEVY RATE FOR 1972-73

Upon motion of Mr. Tunstall, seconded by Mr. Rundle, all members voting "aye", the following resolution was adopted.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Dinwiddie, Virginia, that there be, and is hereby levied for the year 1972 a tax of \$3.70 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation on all taxable real estate located in this County, and that there be and is hereby levied for the year 1972 a tax of \$3.70 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of all taxable machinery and tools located in this County on January 1, 1972, and that there be and is hereby levied for the year 1972 a tax of \$3.70 per hundred dollars of assessed valuation of all taxable tangible personal property located in this County on January 1, 1972- the respective levies hereby ordered being also applicable to the real estate and tangible personal property of public service corporations, based upon the assessment thereof fixed by the State Corporation Commission and duly certified.

IN RE: HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT - MR. LANCASTER & MR. MEDLOCK

Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, all members voting "aye", the Highway Department was requested to survey and place speed limit signs on the following roads and sections of roads. Route 609 for a distance of 1/2 mile east beginning at Route 626, all of Route 740, Route 619 South from the Seaboard Coastline Railroad to Route 660, all of Route 1333 in Ferndale Gardens Subdivision and all the roads in Rohoic Farms Subdivision. Mr. Rundle again brought up the problem concerning gravel flying from dump trucks on Route 603. He asked if there was not something that could be done about this problem. The Board asked the Commonwealth's Attorney to seek a solution to this matter.

Mr. Lancaster reported that the Highway Department had been in touch with the people that lived on the road that the Roadviewers viewed this year. This road is to the rear of "Ye Blue Tartan" off of U. S. #1. Mr. Lancaster stated that there had been some disagreement among the people as to exactly where the road should be located and they

were to get in touch with him when this had been solved.

IN RE: DABNEY ESTATES SUBDIVISION - ADDITION TO SECONDARY SYSTEM
GIBSON DRIVE - CHARLOTTE ROAD

It appearing to the Board that Gibson Drive, beginning at a point on Route 613, 0.18 mile west of Route 1110 and running in a southerly direction 0.44 mile to Ann Road, this road having been constructed, drained, and surfaced in accordance with State Highway specifications and county subdivision ordinance, and,

WHEREAS, it is further appearing to the Board that Charlotte Road, beginning at a point on Gibson Drive, 0.13 mile south of Route 613 and running in an easterly direction 0.16 mile to Route 1110, this road having been constructed, drained, and surfaced in accordance with State Highway specifications and county subdivision ordinances, and,

WHEREAS, the plat of the subdivision is recorded in Plat Book 8, Page 80, showing the owner's consent and dedication of a 50' right-of-way.

Upon motion duly made and carried that the Virginia Department of Highways be requested to add these streets to the Secondary System of Dinwiddie County with the provision that the subdivider furnish the Highway Department with the required bond.

IN RE: ABIDCO

Mr. Norman Sisisky, President ABIDCO and its Executive Director, Mr. W. H. Caldwell, appeared before the Board in behalf of their organization. Mr. Sisisky told the Board that he believed the cities and the counties had gotten more than their money's worth out of ABIDCO in the previous years and it would cost each individual county and city much more to have an industrial division organized such as ABIDCO. But, ABIDCO needed more money to operate and he was calling on all the political subdivisions requesting they up their annual contribution. Mr. Sisisky asked that Dinwiddie County double their present contributions of \$2,000.00. He thought that the counties would certainly receive just compensation for the \$4,000.00 contributed and he would certainly work to this end.

Mr. Tunstall suggested the Board of Supervisors meet with the County's Water Authority and the County's Industrial Development Authority to discuss this matter. The Board advised Mr. Sisisky that they would take his request under consideration and advise him and Mr. Caldwell of their decision in the very near future.

IN RE: CAMP 27 - BLOOD HOUNDS

Mr. Hargrave informed the Board that he had been requested by the Captain, G. J. Woody, to exempt Camp 27 from purchasing dog licenses for their two blood hounds.

Upon motion of Mr. Tunstall, seconded by Mr. Winn, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Winn, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Crowder and Mr. Hargrave, voting "aye", the Board agreed to this request.

IN RE: SOLID WASTE MEETING JUNE 22, 1972

Mr. Hargrave advised the Board of a meeting in Richmond June 22, 1972 concerning solid waste and asked the Executive Secretary to attend.

IN RE: STREET LIGHT - ROHOIC FARMS - FAIRWAY ROAD


Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Crowder, all members voting "aye", the Executive Secretary was authorized to instruct VEPCO to install a street light on Pole #1352B in Rohoic Farms Subdivision.

IN RE: CITIZENS SPEAKING

Mr. William Jarratt asked about the proposed road off of Route 613 in Slab Town. The Executive Secretary advised him that there was not sufficient information to tell exactly where the road would be located, nor how long it would be.

Mr. J. R. Drinkwater asked the State Highway Department to look into the problem that arises when one wishes to turn left on Route 600 from Route 601, because of a high bank that made it impossible to see on coming traffic. The Executive Secretary told Mr. Drinkwater he would advise the Highway Department of this problem.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 4:00 P.M.
