IN RE: MINUTES

Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Winn, all members voting "aye", the minutes of the March 21st meeting were approved as presented.

IN RE: PAYMENT OF SALARIES & CLAIMS

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Winn, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Crowder and Mr. Hargrave voting "aye", it is ordered by the Board that the accounts against the following funds for the month of March 1973, be issued payable out of the respective accounts. General Fund - Checks numbering 73-373 through 73-442 amounting to \$25,307.73. Dog Fund - Checks numbering D-73-23 through D-73-28 amounting to \$698.33.

IN RE: BUILDING INSPECTOR

Mr. James L. Blaha, Building Inspector, presented his report for the month of March 1973.

IN RE: TREASURER

Mr. F. E. Jones, Treasurer, presented his report for the month of March 1973.

IN RE: DOG WARDEN

Mr. A. W. Chappell, Dog Warden, presented his report for the month of March 1973.

Mr. Chappell presented a claim for Mr. A. R. Wells, for 12 pigs, valued at \$216.00. Mr. Wells had several dogs and it was unknown to Mr. Chappell whether Mr. Wells's dogs or stray dogs had killed these pigs.

Upon motion of Mr. Crowder, seconded by Mr. Winn, All members voting "aye", the Board postponed a decision on Mr. Wells' claim until the Sheriff and the Dog Warden could conduct an investigation.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Winn, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Crowder, and Mr. Hargrave voting "aye", the following claims were approved by the Board: Maggie Nicholas - 4 hens - \$4.00; St. Mark Street - 20 chickens - \$20.00; Virginia Street - 12 hens - \$12.00; John Jackson - 13 hens - \$13.00; Claude Mann - 3 hens - \$3.00.

IN RE: SUPERINTENDENT SCHOOLS

Mr. T. W. Newsom, School Superintendent, asked the Board to bring up during the highway portion of the meeting that Route 622 between Route 610 and Route 645 needed widening because school buses had to go into the ditch when meeting other vehicles.

Mr. Newsom also told the Board that the School Board should finish drafting the budget at its next meeting, on Tuesday, April 10th and would like to meet with the Board on Wednesday, April 11th. The Board agreed to this meeting.

IN RE: DIRECTOR SOCIAL SERVICES

Mrs. King B. Talley, Director, Department of Social Services, presented and recommended approval of two State and Local Hospitalization application.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Rundle, Mr. Winn, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Crowder, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Hargrave voting "aye", the SLH application of Alice Mae Johnson was approved.

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Winn, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Crowder, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Hargrave, voting "aye", the SLH application of Bailey Alexander was approved.

IN RE: ROADVIEWERS

Upon motion duly made and carried, the following were appointed Roadviewers for 1973. Mr. C. E. Thweatt, Mr. M. E. Bass, Mr. W. A. Prosise, Mr. William Green and Mr. C. Y. Avery, Jr.

IN RE: SHERIFF

Mr. Charles L. Mitchell, Sheriff, presented to the Board Deputy Sheriff L. B. Mayes and Jailer, George Johnson.

IN RE: REZONING P-73-1 DEFENSE SUPPLY ASSOCIATION

This being the time and place as advertised in the Progress-Index on March 21st and 28th for the Board of Supervisors to hold a public hearing to consider the rezoning application of the Defense Supply Association, 1026 17th Street, Washington D. C., to have land parcel 2A containing 50.4 acres, 2B containing 113.25 acres and 3 containing 194.97 acres as shown on Section 33 of the zoning map of Dinwiddie County, located in Rohoic District generally between Route 613 and U.S. Route 1, rezoned from Agricultural A-2 to Residential R-2.

Mr. J. R. Reid, Senior associate of Case & Company Inc., Cleveland, Ohio, and Mr. Worley, of Cadie, Kirk and Worley in Cleveland, Ohio, appeared in behalf of this rezoning application. Mr. & Mrs. G. C. Charboneau, Mr. Gene Wilson and Mr. Sol Landsman also appeared in behalf of this rezoning application. No one appeared in opposition.

Mr. Reid stated that this would be a planned residential development using the cluster approach. The following charts show how the land plans to be used.

Mr. Rundle, who is the Board's representative to the Planning Commission explained to the Board and Mr. Reid that the Planning Commission was presently studying a planned residential development ordinance. Mr. Reid stated that his group would rather work under a planned residential development ordinance than under the classification they were seeking - Residential R-2.

Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Winn, all members voting "aye", the proposed residential development of the Lake Jordan property presented by Mr. Reid on behalf of the American Logistics Association is acceptable to the Board of Supervisors, but the request for rezoning of this property is tabled until such time as the planned residential development ordinance now under study by the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors is adopted.

IN RE: ANNUAL MEETING - HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

This being the time and place as advertised in the Progress-Index on March 21st and 28th for the State Highway Department to meet with the Board of Supervisors of Dinwiddie County, in accordance with Section 33.1-70 of the Code of Virginia. The Board of Supervisors will hear request from interested citizens for improvements on the Secondary system of roads, after which, the Board of Supervisors will make recommendations to the State Highway Department regarding these roads.

Mr. R. V. Lancaster, III, and Mr. B. C. Medlock, represented the Highway Department. The Board accepted requests from interested citizens by Magisterial Districts.

ROHOIC DISTRICT 1 - Mrs. Charles Murdock asked the status of the road to be taken into the State Secondary System that begins behind Ye Blue Tartan, off of Route U.S. 1. Mr. Medlock told Mrs. Murdock that as soon as all landowners agreed on the location of the road it would be taken into the state system. 2-River Road - Route 601 - Mr. Crowder, asked that improvements, principally, widening, be made from Route 600 to Route 776. 3- Ritchie Avenue Extended - Mr. Rundle asked that this road be taken into the State Secondary System. Mr. Rundle was advised that this road was to be viewed by the Roadviewers the latter part of this month.

NAMOZINE DISTRICT 1 - Route 690, Mrs. Lottie Williams requested that this road be hard surfaced. She was told by Mr. Lancaster that this road did not have the proper auto count. The minimum count was 50 necessary to hard surface this road. A new road count would be taken sometime this year. 2- Route 699 - Mr. Glendon Watkins representing a large contingent from his area requested that Route 699 be hard surfaced beginning at Route 708 for a distance of 1.7 miles. Mr. James Potts presented a petition containing 26 signatures of users of Route 699 requesting that it be hard surfaced.

Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Winn, all members voting "aye", the Board of Supervisors recommended to the State Highway Department that they honor this request from Mr. Glendon Watkins and his group to hard surface Route 699 beginning at Route 708 for a distance of 1.7 miles. 3 - Route 708 - W. C. Knott, County Administrator, on behalf of Mrs. E. L. Clay, requested that proper signs be placed on Route 708 indicating its intersection with Route 623. In addition, about ½ mile west of this intersection, there is a bad curve that signs should be placed, warning motorist of its danger.

SAPONY DISTRICT - 1 - Route 681 - Mr. Tunstall, on behalf of Mr. James M. Burrow, requested that improvements be made to Route 681.

DARVILLS DISTRICT -1- Route 645 - Mrs. Joy Byrd asked when Route 645 was going to be hard surfaced. Mr. Medlock and Mr. Lancaster informed Mrs. Byrd that the right-of-way was in the process of being acquired on this road and hard surfacing should be accomplished within the next two or three years. 2- Route 622 - As requested by Mr. T. W. Newsom, Superintendent Schools, the Board requested that improvements be made on Route 622, between Route 610 and Route 645. This road was very narrow and school buses had difficulty when meeting traffic.

ROWANTY DISTRICT 1 - Railroad signals on Route 657 and Route 656. Mrs. Price presented petitions bearing many signatures requesting that railroad signals be placed on Route 657 and Route 656. 2- Route 604 - Mr. A. W. Chappell, because of the narrowness of Route 604, requested improvements be made. 3- Route 656- The County Administrator advised Mr. Medlock and Mr. Lancaster that Mr. John R. Ragsdale indicated that Mr. William Ellis was ready to give additional right-of-way to complete the hard surfacing and improvement on Route 656 running from U. S. Route 1 to Route 650.

IN RE: MAITLAND VILLAGE SUBDIVISION EXTENDED - ADDITION TO SECONDARY SYSTEM - CHURCH DRIVE - FLOYD AVENUE - FOREST AVENUE JAMES AVENUE

It appearing to the Board that Church Drive, beginning at a point on Frontage Road V and running in a northerly direction 0.08 miles and in a southerly direction 0.19 miles to dead end, total length 0.27 miles, this road having been constructed, drained, and surfaced in accordance with State Highway Specifications and County Subdivision Ordinance, and,

WHEREAS, it further appears to the Board that Floyd Avenue, beginning at a point on Church Drive and Frontage Road V and running in a westerly direction, 0.34 miles to dead end, this road having been constructed, drained, and surfaced in accordance with State Highway Specifications and County Subdivision ordinance, and,

WHEREAS, it further appears to the Board that Forest Avenue, a road beginning at a point on Floyd Avenue, 0.22 miles west of Frontage Road V, and running in a northerly direction, 0.09 miles to dead end, this road having been constructed, drained, and surfaced in accordance with the State Highway Specifications and County Subdivision ordinance, and,

WHEREAS, it further appears to the Board that James Avenue, a road beginning at a point on Forest Avenue, 0.09 miles west of Frontage Road V and running in a westerly direction, 0.12 miles to dead end, this road having been constructed, drained, and surfaced in accordance with the State Highway Specifications and County Subdivision ordinance, and,

WHEREAS, the plat of this subdivision is recorded in Plat Book 7, Page 108, dated December 13, 1968 showing the owner's consent and dedication of a 50' right-of-way. Motion was duly made and carried that the Virginia Department of Highways be requested to add these streets to the Secondary System of Dinwiddie County effective July 1, 1973, with the provision that the maintenance bond and maintenance fee be waived.

IN RE: KEEP VIRGINIA BEAUTIFUL INCORPORATED

Upon motion of Mr. Winn, seconded by Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Winn, Mr. Tunstall, Mr. Crowder, Mr. Rundle, Mr. Hargrave voting "aye", the Board of Supervisors appropriated \$50.00 to keep Virginia Beautiful Inc.

IN RE: LANDFILL OPERATOR

Upon motion of Mr. Rundle, seconded by Mr. Winn, all members voting "aye", the Board of Supervisors authorized the County Administrator to hire a landfill operator with the maximum salary of \$7,500.00.


IN RE: MANDATORY HOOKUP ORDINANCE WATER & SEWAGE


IN RE: LINE OF DUTY ACT 15.1-136.1

The Board would have to adopt an ordinance to put this in effect.
