Mary Mabry Benjamin was born September 6, 1946, in Dinwiddie County. She is the oldest of two children born to Sunnie P. Mabry and Barbara Branch Mabry. Ms. Mabry attended Mason Town Elementary, a Rosenwald School, and graduated from Southside High School in 1964. She attended Virginia State College (now University) and graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Foods & Nutrition, in 1968. Thirty-five years later, Ms. Benjamin graduated from the University of Phoenix, with a Master's degree in Organizational Management.

Ms. Mabry worked in Food Services for Richmond Public Schools for one year. After marrying her late husband, Charles Benjamin, in 1969, the couple moved to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania where Mrs. Benjamin worked for 35 years in Food Services for a public school system. She retired in 2005 and returned to Dinwiddie County in 2008.

Charles and Mary Benjamin had two children, Edwin and Traci. Edwin lives in North Carolina with his wife, Dr. Shanna Green Benjamin, and their two children, Chloe and Spencer; Traci resides in New Jersey.

Upon return to Dinwiddie County, Ms. Benjamin met Mrs. Doretha Moody (2017 Hometown Hero), who encouraged her to work on Barak Obama's first Presidential campaign. At the same time, she joined the Dinwiddie Democratic Committee where she met the late Ms. Ruby Evans (2018 Hometown Hero), who encouraged her to serve on the County's Electoral Board. Six months later, in 2015, Circuit Court Clerk Barrett Chappell encouraged Ms. Benjamin to run for the Dinwiddie County School Board.

Since that time, Mrs. Benjamin has served as both Chair and Vice-Chair of the School Board. She has served on the governing boards of Rowanty Technical Center, and the Appomattox Regional Governor's School. Currently, she serves on the governing boards of Maggie Walker and Code RVA. Most recently, Mrs. Benjamin was the Regional Vice Chairman and Chairman of the Virginia School Board Association (VSBA). She has participated actively in VSBA events each year of her service for the school board. Because of her commitment to education and others, Mrs. Benjamin was named the 2017
